

FAMILYSEARCH – AFFILIATED LIBRARY ACCESS

We are pleased that members and visitors doing research in our Research Room are now able to view many restricted digitised images on our computers. Researchers will need to have their own personal sign in and we request that personal login details are not remembered on our Society computers.

Much of the indexing and loaded images are not searchable through the Search menu. They will need to be searched by going to the Catalog (sic) and searching for a place name or other option, then selecting the type of record of interest. When you notice a film number with a transcript anywhere in your research, it is worth searching for that Film Number in the Catalog as it is sometimes possible to see original images of material such as parish registers, bishop's transcripts, etc. which will show you more than the transcription.

FamilySearch are continually loading a multitude of images to the familysearch.org website so if what you are looking for is not currently available, keep checking. If you are searching at home and find a camera icon with a key above it, remember to make a note of the Film Number and come into our room to check it out.

WHAT WAS THE VOYAGE TO AUSTRALIA AND EARLY LIFE REALLY LIKE?



Christopher Lean was the youngest of three **Lean** brothers, (one of whom was my GGG Grandfather, **Robert Lean**) who emigrated to Australia. He sailed from Plymouth on 21.11.1838 on the ***Orient***, arriving on 4.4.1839. Prior to this he had left St. Kew in Cornwall with four of his friends and was recorded as being ‘*introduced into the colony of NSW on a Government Bounty by Mr Gus Marshall of London in pursuance of the Colonial Secretaries Authority to his agent here - Messrs. Walker and Co.*’ His bounty was 18 pounds and he was listed as being a farmer’s son, aged 21, of Protestant religion; of very good health; from Cornwall and he could read and write. On the ***Orient*** there were 50 families, 1 single man (Christopher), 1 single woman, 13 single females and 17 single males.

It is through the prolific writings of this wonderful man that so much of the **Lean** history in Australia is known. In writing to his niece, Mary, he related that they ‘*experienced some very rough weather with heavy seas for 3 weeks. After passing the Bay of Biscay they had fine weather for nearly the whole passage to Sydney - a long voyage of 127 days*’. His diary describes the trip in detail - the mountainous seas, delightful weather and sunshine as he had never experienced before, rain that he couldn't stand: ‘*I never in my life saw rain fall so heavy in England as it does here - if a person were to stay in it for two minutes he would be wet to the skin*’, conditions on the ship, children dying, fishing, the food etc. He concluded his writings a few days prior to their arrival in Capetown. It was another long 10 weeks across the Indian Ocean before the ***Orient*** finally dropped anchor in Port Jackson.

In another letter to **Mary Lean**, Christopher describes his arrival in Australia:

*'I had not been in Sydney 2 days before I got hired out to a gentleman as a sheep overseer to go back 400 miles in the bush to take charge of a sheep station at a salary of 30 pounds per year. In addition to wages men are supplied with what is termed a weekly ration consisting of 12 lbs. beef or mutton, 10 lbs. flour, half lb. tea and 2 lbs. sugar. Each man must cook for himself or employ a substitute to cook for him. This allowance is found to be ample for any man. As everything was in my charge, I, as a matter of course, was allowed the privilege of using whatever I required without stint. On starting from Sydney for the station I found that two men, a team of bullocks and a dray laden with supplies for the station were placed in my charge with instructions to proceed on the journey with all possible despatch Reached our destination safely in six weeks of time. I became regularly installed in office having under me a gang of convicts as servants, no free men being procurable. The life, which at first seemed likely to be dull and monotonous, proved quite the contrary. I spent two years on this station quite contentedly and without encountering a single incident worthy of recording..... The whole time passed away very comfortably. An offer of higher wages induced me to leave this station and engage on one much larger adjoining. I engaged for 12 months, after which I returned to Sydney and forwarded to Maitland and joined my brother **Bob** on a small farm, remaining with him until our brother **George** joined us".*

The good news of living conditions on the Hunter as conveyed in Robert's letters no doubt influenced Christopher to join his brother. George was to write to them advising them of the deaths of their father and later their mother back in Cornwall.

The three brothers didn't think it advisable to remain in partnership together so Christopher and George went into partnership which was to become a very successful farming enterprise until George's death in 1856. The farm was at '**Rosebank**' later known as '**Birralee**' and up until fairly recent times, remains of the old house were still standing. Numerous letters from Christopher to the family back in **St Kew** describe the conditions and farming in Australia. After the early deaths of George and his wife Elizabeth, Christopher - still single, found himself in charge of seven young children from 18 to 4 years of age. He was then 43 and so after a swift courtship married 19 year old **Eliza**, the daughter of the School master at **Fosterton**. Despite the differences in age and the ready-made family, the 'judicious arrangement' quickly developed into a love match as can be seen in the letters Christopher wrote to Eliza at the times they were apart.

With a comfortable marriage and his own children and his nephews in their late teens and early twenties assisting him in the running of the farm, Christopher appeared to take a much greater interest in local affairs and the effect on their lifestyle. He successfully petitioned the Government to grant a sum of money to build a school house and teachers' cottage on a piece of his land. Tenders were called, the buildings completed and a teacher appointed within 4 months of commencement. *'It is impossible to calculate the immense benefit we have derived from this school since its erection.....my children have all received their elementary education at the school.'*

In another letter he wrote to the Lands Office requesting that immediate steps be taken and the road from Dungog be opened. He began a series of correspondence with the local newspaper, **The Maitland Examiner**, providing his view point on local and district affairs.....'what we want then is not only a bridge for a medical man to cross, but also a medical man to cross the bridge. If **Dr McKinlay** is really such a champion in the defence of the interests of the district, as represented by 'another constant reader', this proposition should have emanated from himself a long time ago. Unfortunately this has not been the case and an imperative duty has now developed on the public. A general call for a medical man should be sounded throughout the length and breadth of the district. Another grave matter of complaint.....is the inefficiency of our magistracy. The appointment of unpaid magistrates is in general bad policy, even from an economical point of view.....'

His letters were profuse and it obvious that he was a strongly outspoken person who took a very active interest in the affairs of Local Government and the **Dungog** District. He was subsequently appointed as a Colonial Magistrate in 1876.

In the early 1880's he and Eliza built the main house at **Figtree** which he described as '*a brick cottage containing 9 rooms with a large cellar beneath where we store our wine. I have a vineyard which produces 900 gallons a year, I find a ready sale at 5/- per gallon. I also have an orange and apple orchard.*' The house is said to be a replica of an old Lean House in Cornwall and typical of a design found to be popular with country gentlemen of the late 1800's. 'Figtree House' has 5 floors. 1st - the cellar, 2nd - a room with an open fireplace and a crane for swinging pots and cooking utensils. On the same level is a sewing room. Stairs lead to the 3rd floor - here is the front door, the veranda, a bedroom and a drawing room- the centre of many musical evenings in the Lean family. The 4th floor houses the main bedroom and the maid's room. The 5th floor had two rooms with a small room in between.

Christopher died on 14 December 1886 at 'Figtree House' at 70 years of age and a lifetime spanning the semi-feudal times of a Cornish village, through the pioneering development of the Western plains of NSW to the commencement of the industrial age. He raised two families - seven children of his brother's and a further eight of his own. After Christopher's death Eliza moved to Dungog where she lived with her daughter Emmaline until her death at 90 years of age in 1930.

* **Find-A-Grave website** has been updated. Some changes are cosmetic, while others are functional and a map feature has been added. **<https://findagrave.com/>**

* **General Records Office Online PDF Certificates Trial Extended:** The GRO has been piloting a service from 12 October 2017 to provide portable document format (PDF) copies of digitised historical birth and death records. The pilot will now run for a minimum of 9 months. Applications for each PDF cost £6, must be made online, and include a GRO index reference. England and Wales records which are available as PDFs in this extended pilot include births from 1837–1916 and deaths from 1837–1957.

- * **Land & Property Information's HLRV have a new web address:** The NSW Land and Property Information (LPI) website **Historical Land Records Viewer (HLRV)**, is now at a new web address: **<http://hlrv.nswlrs.com.au>** The HLRV provides online access to more than 2.5 million images of historical maps, plans, titles and indexes. While many digitised records are viewable online from any computer, digitised Crown Plans are available to view online exclusively in the LPI Reading Room.
- * **Gravesites of Tasmania Headstones and Family Genealogy:** In over the past 14 years they have acquired lots of different information relating to Tasmania which is progressively being added to their new website. If there are any broken links please let them know as the link may have been overlooked in updates. **<http://www.gravesoftas.com.au/>**
- * A selection of **Sands & McDougall** directories ranging from 1860 to 1974 have been digitised and uploaded to the Victorian State Library website – and searching by keyword/name is a breeze! Some exciting news for those researching the life and times of their metropolitan ancestors and something to note, from 1902 onwards, the directories also cover country Victoria, and some Albury businesses (just over the river from Wodonga in NSW) have adverts listed too. You'll find detailed street by street information for Melbourne and the suburbs, and lengthy lists of names for country areas. Keep in mind it wasn't compulsory to be listed in the Directory. You can access the collection of directories via the SLV's digitised collection library at **<http://cedric.slv.vic.gov.au/R?RN=319873096>** and while you're there, you should definitely check out the other records they have listed
The **Melbourne History Workshop** (part of Melbourne Uni) also has a digitised collection of these directories of these directories – every year between 1857 and 1880. So, if you can't find it on the SLV website, try Melbourne Uni at **<https://omeka.cloud.unimelb.edu.au/melbourne-history/about>**
- * **Scottish Indexes** website at **<http://www.scottishindexes.co.uk/>** is one to help you trace your Scottish family tree and find out more about the lives of your ancestors by helping you access historic documents that are in Scotland. You can search their indexes or go to their Record Sets page and search by individual category. Their Coverage page shows what they have indexed to date.
- * **FamilySearch:** Since September 2017 they are continually adding more worldwide datasets since ceasing microfilm circulations so it is especially worth checking regularly. You can subscribe to their Blog at **<https://www.familysearch.org/blog/en/>** Don't forget also to check the Catalogue (sic) for datasets which could have been digitised (parish records, bishops' transcripts & more) but are not indexed including some which can be accessible in our Research Room (the ones which have a key icon over the image icon).

They have also released 2.7 million ship passenger records from the 1930s - outbound passenger records for **ships that departed United Kingdom** ports between 1930 and 1939. These records come from the National Archives (BT27 series). Typical records in this collection list people travelling to America, Canada, India, New Zealand and Australia as well as several other ports around the world.
- * **ScotlandsPeople:** Now that it is 2018, a new batch of records can be legally released on the website. Births in 1917, marriages in 1942 and deaths in 1967 have gone online. In total, some 233,000 new records have

been added and the records can be searched by first name, last name and year range. ScotlandsPeople is the official genealogy website of the Scottish government. It is run by brightsolid, the same company that owns Findmypast. Access is by subscription. <https://www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk/search-our-records>

NOTE: Our Society has subscriptions to Ancestry, Findmypast and The Genealogist as well as BDA and BNA **AND** remember to keep re-checking sites you have searched before as most are constantly adding new records, especially Trove Newspapers, Findmypast, Ancestry, The Genealogist, etc.






